I have attended every Academy meeting since becoming a faculty in 1994 as well as a few as a resident and have participated actively during the meetings by presenting at all meetings and moderating panels, miniseminars and instruction courses since 2000. As a head and neck surgeon I have been involved in the Head & Neck Surgery oncology committee from 2005-2010. However my main involvement with the Academy has been in the research arena. I am a surgeon-scientist and was a recipient of a CORE grant in 1997 which hebadsme laying work metargeted therapy. Having been given this opportunity through the academy I Page 1 have felt very strongly that the Academy is an important source of funding for otolaryngologists to establish

their research careers. Hence I have served on the CORE for many years and having been chair of the AHNS research committee have been actively involved in increasing funding sources for CORE. I was part of the search committee for AAO-HNS research director in 2009 and more recently served on the committee to identify research gaps in 2012. I have also been a reviewer for Otolaryngology/HNS for many years and served on the editorial review panel in 2002. I was a recipient of the AAO-HNS Honors award in 2001 & 2008, received the distinguished service award in 2014 and currently serve on the Program Advisory Committee for 2013-2015. I hope to continue to increase my involvement by serving on the Board as "Director at Large" of this wonderful organization. Through my involvement with the academy and several other organizations such as the American Head & Neck Society (AHNS), Head & Neck Cancer Alliance (HNCA), Society of University Otolaryngologists (SUO) & the Triologic Society, I have been fortunate to get to know, up close, many of the dynamic and passionate leaders in our field. My experience working with these exemplary leaders and visionaries over the past two decades will help me make the critical decisions needed to lead our Academy through the unchartered healthcare landscape we face over the next few years.

I have served on the Nominating committee for the AHNS in 2008 and have been on their Board of Trustee for the Foundation in 2009 and was on the Council members at large in 2012. I was elected chair of the research committee for 2 successive terms (2009-2012) during which I interacted with CORE leaders to increase funding for CORE and played an important role in increasing funding for reviewers to attend CORE during our leadership retreat committee meeting in 2009. Currently I serve as chair of the finance committee for the AHNS (2012-2015) and was part of the Ad Hoc Search committee to determine which managing company should help run the AHNS. My role on this committee was to reach out to chairs of all committee members and the AHNS leadership to determine the pros and cons of our current managing company. This allowed me to get to know many members in leadership roles and work with them to identify gaps and strengths provided by the firm. I have also been on the Program Committee for the AHNS since 2006 and served on the International Program committee since 2007. I will be the Poster chair for the 1Xth International meeting in 2016 which has once again allowed me to get to know the membership well. Other committees I have served on are the Prevention Committee 2012-2015 & the Publications committee 2007-2009.More recently I serve on the Women in AHNS Task Force

I have been a Board member of the Head & Neck Cancer Alliance since 2010 and have been actively involved in the Search Committee for an Executive Director for the HNCA. I also serve as the Director of Research for the HNCA since 2010 and have helped institute new funding opportunities for Cancer Prevention and Education.

My involvement with the leadership of our Triologic Society started in 2000 when I was on the Program Committee for Southern Section in 2000. I have been on the Triologic Society Best Practices Committee since 2012 & the Program Committee for Trio Annual Meeting 2014, Trio combined spring meetings 2014. More recently I have been asked to serve on a new ad hoc committee for the Trio the "National Otolaryngology Physician-Scientist Assembly (NOPSA)" to increase the number of physician-scientists and improve support for their work.

I was involved with the SUO Young Academicians committee since 1998-2010 and was part of the first women academic group at the SUO and was asked to be their first speaker at their dinner. I currently serve on the audit committee ofr the SUO and the nominating committee for AADO. In addition I have been involved with the Education committee for the American Academy of Otolaryngologists from India since 2001 and served as Moderator & Poster discussant for multiple meetings for AHNS, Trio, ASCO, & the Academy.

Finally I was recently nominated to be one of three head and neck members to the NCI Steering committee as the surgeon representative.

What experience do you have with hospital leadership, medical staff, community service, or other nonotolaryngology organizations that uniquely qualify you for the position for which you are being considered?"

Other national organizations that I have worked with closely are the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) where I was on ASCO's Invited program scientific committee for head and neck from 2009-2012 which required going to their headquarters in DC to establish the program for their annual meeting. I was asked to be a Faculty for ASCOs online module on HNCa which allowed me to get to know oncologists in the head & neck field. I have also served as faculty for both ASCO & the American Society for Radiation Oncology as well as the American College of Surgeons National Biomarker committee in 1999.

I serve on the NCI Task Force for Locally advanced HNSCC since 2007 and work closely with the Steering committee for Head and Neck cancer. This year I have been nominated to the NCI Steering committee. I have also served on multiple ad hoc study sections for the NCI and NIDCR and was asked to be a permanent study section member of CONC in 2011.

Our hospital LSU-Health has recently undergone privatization and I have been elected as their first Chief of Staff for University Health the new hospital entity. Hence I have been very involved during this transition with writing Bylaws, helping set up a Practice plan and negotiating Physician service agreements. As part of my home work during this transition I have reached out to leaders in our field who have gone through this transition and got to know physicians who understand hospital economics and the dynamics between academic institutions and hospitals very well. We have had some trying times during these difficult negotiations and as chief of staff I have helped bring physician issues to the Hospital Board and have helped negotiate some difficult issues with regards to compliance.

I was selected as the only representative of Northwest LA to be on the Search committee for the President of the entire LSU system for the state for all campuses. In addition I have served on the search committees for the Dean of LSU in 2005, Chancellor of LSU-Shreveport 2008, Cancer Center Director, Vice-Chancellor for Research, chair of the orthopedic search committee and pathology chairman search committee. I have served as the Clinical Affairs Advisory Committee to the Dean 2013, Medical Advisory Council to Chancellor 2010, Research Advisory committee since 2000, been Chair of the Promotion Committee in 2010, LCME subcommittee 2013 and have been on the Board of the Cancer Center from 2002. Diversity in all organizations is extremely important and my role on the Diversity Task Force instituted in 2011 helped me formulate much of the planning for diversity on our campus.

At the state level I have served on the Gene Therapy Consortium for the State of LA, Board of Directors for Shreveport Medical Society (SMS) & the Committee for Disaster Medicine Reform in 2008 after Hurricane Katrina. I have also been on the SMS media committee.

I feel very strongly that we should all give back to our community and have chosen to stay in Shreveport because of my involvement with a vibrant community that we have in our city. I served on the Board of Directors for Sciport the Science Museum from 2011-2014 & was on their advisory committee in 2010. I have been on two school boards for the Magnet school system in Shreveport and was nominated to speak at the school board when funding was short & survival of the Magnet schools was a concern in 2005. With my kids we have started monthly birthday parties at a Homeless shelter in Shreveport "The Providence House) since 2008 and provided computer facilities and skype for residents at "Holy Angels" a facility for mentally challenged patients who come here from all over the country and cannot get to see their families. We also have a "Nathan Family Trio" and raise funds for the Shreveport Symphony, Opera and Cancer research through our musical performances in town.

I have been actively involved in free screenings and awareness of head and neck cancer since 1997 and have organized screenings for homeless shelters using a mobile screening van and thanks to the work of a dedicated Cancer coordinator. I have promoted Women in Medicine through a Dean TV show since 2002 & was nominated for Women who made a difference to Shreveport in 1998. I was honored to be Selected by

Shreveport-Bossier Magazine as one of Creative Folks in Shreveport in 2013 & by the S-B Chamber of Commerce for the Athena Award in 2012. Our medical school which has been the rock of my career honored me with the Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine Award presented by the Arnold Gold Foundation in 2012 & Grateful patients started "The Nathan Endowed Professorship" in 2010 which has allowed me to continue to

promote funding opportunities for high school, undergraduate, minority students & medical students for research during the summer months.

What is your primary motivation for considering running for this position? Our leaders of the Academy have shown us all how their unselfish and untiring work can make a huge difference to the future of healthcare for our patients through education, research and lobbying. In this age of tumultuous healthcare and conflicting opinions, I would love to represent the views of our members as it is critical to getting the mission accomplished. I believe that my involvement with multiple organizations through board membership & committees have given me the opportunity to personally know members who are passionate about making things better for our academy members and our patients and I have had the good fortune to learn from them. I would like to be part of the Academy leadership that helps mold the future of healthcare and work with our future leaders as I have worked closely with many of the members through my involvement with multiple organizations over the years.

## Summation of Published Works Within the Specialty

I have 142 Peer reviewed publications and published proceedings with the focus being head and neck cancer. Our original work on Targeted Therapy for molecular positive margins with Akt/mTOR inhibitors has resulted in a "Multi-institutional Clinical Trial" and NIH RO1 grants. We have written multiple book chapters on Biomarkers in HNSCC. We have also published some novel work on the role of radiosensitizing agents in the Akt/mTOR pathway to decrease the toxicity of cisplatin used in HNSCC patients. The above work is focused on advanced stage patients. For early stage disease our research efforts on "Improving Bioavailability of Curcumin for Prevention of Cancer has also resulted in a clinical trial and NCI funding. This has also led to a patent on curcumin formulations and an IND. We also have publications in the area of Skin Carcinogenesis and Curcumin and our resident secured a resident research grant from the Academy. Our work on targeted therapy was first supported by a grant awarded to me through the Academy which certainly laid the foundation for future grants. More recently with the epidemic of HPV associated cancers we have some novel work on the role of coinfection of EBV and HPV in HNSCC. In addition we have published original work on botox in the larynx, reflux in laryngectomy patients and voice disorders. Our work demonstrates the importance a surgeon-scientist plays in moving novel ideas from the bench to the bedside. Being competitive for national funding and participating in other head and neck societies as multi-disciplinary approach for our head and neck patients is important has helped in coordinating multi-institutional trials. In addition I am an editor on two head and neck surgery books and have contributed to14 chapters in Otolaryngology Text Books.
