# Short Term Funding Agreement Reached

On January 25, President Trump signed a Continuing Resolution to reopen the federal government and resume operations through February 15. Negotiations will continue over the coming weeks as both the Administration and U.S. Congress seek compromise on a long-term funding agreement.

## Advocacy in Action: AAO-HNS Comments on Continuing Board Certification

On January 14, the AAO-HNS <u>submitted comments</u> on the ABMS Vision Initiative's Draft Report on Continuing Board Certification. While lifelong learning is essential, the AAO-HNS believes professional self-regulation through continuous learning and assessment must fit within the normal flow of a physician's practice and be available at a reasonable expense. The letter highlights the Academy's concerns with several of the Initiative's recommendations, including the consolidation of ABMS oversight at the expense of individual specialty boards and the expectation that all diplomates participate annually in continuing certification programs.

## AAO-HNS Signs Regulatory Relief Letter to ONC

On January 28, the AAO-HNS joined the Physician Clinical Registry Coalition in <u>submitting comments</u> on the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology's draft *Strategy on Reducing Regulatory and Administrative Burden Relating to the Use of Health IT and EHRs*. The Coalition's comments highlight the important role that QCDRs, including Reg-ent, and other clinical data registries play in promoting quality care, while noting concerns relating to EHR interoperability and the usability of exchanged information.

## Academy Continues Advocacy on Coverage of Balloon Sinus Ostial Dilation

In response to member feedback, the AAO-HNS submitted multiple comment letters to various private payers opposing their coverage policies designating balloon sinus ostial dilation as experimental/investigational. ## AAO-HNS Releases Updated and New Position Statements

Following an extensive review process by AAO-HNS Committees and the Physician Payment Policy (3P) Workgroup, the AAO-HNS Board of Directors' Executive Committee approved one <u>updated Position Statement on</u> <u>Uvulopalatopharyngoplasty</u> and one new statement on <u>Care of Children Infected with Cytomegalovirus.</u>

\*Contributions to ENT PAC are not deductible as charitable contributions for federal income tax purposes. Contributions are voluntary, and all members of the American Academy of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery have the right to refuse to contribute without reprisal. Federal law prohibits ENT PAC from accepting contributions from foreign nationals. By law, if your contributions are made using a personal check or credit card, ENT PAC may use your contribution only to support candidates in federal elections. All corporate contributions to ENT PAC will be used for educational and administrative fees of ENT PAC, and other activities permissible under federal law. Federal law requires ENT PAC to use its best efforts to collect and report the name, mailing address, occupation, and the name of the employer of individuals whose contributions exceed \$200 in a calendar year.

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
